EVER WONDER WHY?

Sometimes I wonder why. Why give so much time and energy for the church? Why work so hard to share talents to enrich the church? Why bother spending money to support the church when there are so many other appealing places to do so? Why am I so invested in Kincardine United Church?

On the first Sunday of this month – world-wide communion Sunday – our custodian, Dave Walker, during his rounds making sure the church building was properly ready for worship, paused to check in if there was anything else that needed attention. Not long after, David Hamilton came into



the church office to make his morning cup of coffee as we chatted about those niggly details that need to be discussed for worship to unfold well, particularly since the choir anthem was inserted into the middle of the communion liturgy because it sang about the powerful place of communion within our lives. Sarah MacKenzie had the bulletins and announcements ready and labelled for me to take upstairs along with the flash drive for the Tech Crew. We, as part of the staff team, showed our dedication to the mission and the ministry of Kincardine United Church.

As I passed through the kitchen, I was warmly greeted warmly by Liz Dillman as she bustled about preparing coffee to be served at the back of the worship space before



worship. I stopped to check in with the Nursery volunteer and the Sunday School teacher to let them know that a greeter would be sent downstairs to invite the children upstairs for communion so they would be included without taking too much time away from the lesson plan. I met with the volunteer servers for communion. talking through the routine and making sure that everyone who wanted to partake in communion was included. I slipped into the Choir Room to share a prayer with the choir, giggling at some of the bad (good!) puns being shared by some. After worship, I apologized to the Tech Crew when I realised that I forgotten to warn them that

the slide show had two slides with the lyrics of the choir anthem which needed to be displayed. They graciously forgave me, sharing a few stories of when things went south on other Sundays. So much time and talent came together to ensure that worship flowed – gifts of self and of time that helped us all to praise God.

The handshakes at the end of worship were matched in warmth and in welcome by the direct, friendly gaze of each person. Many people joined in groups in the



Fellowship Hall to share conversation at table, a wonderful practice mirroring the communion shared in worship. Blessed by an abundance of refreshments prepared by that month's house group, conversation flowed with laughter, with caring and with grace. Companionship was shared as another gift of time and of space to one another.

In this small snapshot of the life of Kincardine United Church, I was blessed. I am blessed not because I am the minister, but because

of the cycle of blessings which were shared in this community of faith that morning – and continue to be shared freely among us all.

I am blessed by relationships fostered within this congregation and into the community. Such relationships provide a sense of belonging for those of us long part of the church and for those of us who yearn for something more but first need to feel they belong.¹

I am blessed by the truth we strive to share in our ministry when we wrestle with the stories of faith – in worship, in study, in mission and in debate – which eschews closed, restrictive ways of being, opening us to a more holistic, affirming, non-judgemental embrace of ambiguity. When we listen to diverse experiences and perspectives within the community "we strengthen our relationships with the diverse populations and build bridges across the different groups and individuals in the community."²



I am blessed by wellness which creates "opportunities for people to rest, play, celebrate, give thanks and encounter each other across class, workplace roles, societal roles, family roles, political differences" (Loaves and Fishes potluck, anyone, or the Dory Lunch, or Sundaes on Sunday?).

It is a continuing, evolving reality for our mission to be healthy and sustainable. When you ponder in what ways you will contribute to Kincardine United Church, consider what brings you life and what makes best use of your time, your talents and your treasure. Let us be disciples in our self-giving as we begin our annual stewardship programme this Sunday.

How is God calling you to share from your bounty of time, of talent and of treasure? How is God calling you to give of your currencies of gracious leadership, of truth, of wellness, of relationship, of money and of time and space? May your intimate prayer with God reveal that call and may you follow that call faithfully.
